### **Welcome from the Co-Chairs**

Christmas came and went; lovely tree lights and carols thanks to all involved in what is now a village tradition. We heard an elderly man who used to be much into village affairs say "Aren't we lucky to have all this?" and that is true. As yet, no snow, but daffodils coming out in early February. Uplands: Internal conversions, with 1, 2, or 3 bedroom flats have been planned as promised. HVRA are not objecting but have made some comments, looking ahead to what could be a fair mix of singles, couples, downsizers, first time buyers and families; a chance for some to move into a beautiful location where adherence to the AONB restrictions and preservation of woodland and wild animal routes were and are promised. Thoughts of new additional traffic have been in discussions and that is the responsibility of Bucks County Council. We can press for a lowered speed limit in Four Ashes Road.

One new topic always generates more discussion; this time parking yet again on Cryers Hill.

The AfLPCharity, (Allotments for the Labouring Poor of Hughenden) now has a new community name, but cannot function yet as it is still delayed in the Courts with the Charity Commission. Nevertheless, it has caused a lot of correspondence from time to time.

Our King George V Field is now under the protection of Fields in Trust and one of their managers made a helpful visit to meet the Sports Initiative Committee. If you remember, the Sports Committee is formed from three constituent groups; The Village Hall, The Football Club and the HVRA. Together that is a very strong group campaigning for a large MUGA and more use of the field in all seasons so that some former sports can be re-introduced, e.g. cricket and tennis, whilst not impeding the future football improvement plans. MUGA plans have been to Pre-Planning and are now in the full Planning Stage. If that is passed we can go ahead for construction and more funding, including funds from the Village! Obviously we will still try for grants too.

We all think that there has been a huge learning curve while finding out the many facets of the Charity Status of the Village Hall and how Sport England works and many other things. The cross fertilisation of ideas and advice from various quarters has been very positive. Thank you to the Parish Council who awarded us a grant of £5720 to start us off. Thanks are due to Matt Hopkins for his input. His family had a lot to do with the original deeds, and to Michael Sole who tracked down many documents from the Village Hall Trustees which were requested by Sport England.

The Treat which the HVRA gives to the Senior Citizens annually is changing this year. Rosemary Hewitt has organised it for the last 30 years but she has now hung up her apron. What a fantastic achievement all this time, with various teams. She is well and truly thanked even though she enjoyed doing it! Also Rosemary organises the Speed Watch and those results are quite illuminating. (Unlike our street lamps which only a couple of months ago had new light bulbs fitted at our request).

We are still lobbying for the repainting of the pedestrian crossing. We are on a long list with other areas.

We support The Chiltern Society, liaise with Neighbourhood Action Group, Neighbourhood Watch, the Village Shop, Village Hall, Parish Council and Hughenden Primary School. We donated £200 to the Bryants Bottom defibrillator appeal. We welcome new Road Rep. Paul Jenner for part of Valley Road. He has already been proactive there. Recently appointed new Parish Councillor Peter Gieler also attends our meeting and he is investigating a new and more challenging play area.

**People care!** In the process they generate many letters, emails, phone calls, meetings and websites. Much is on a.k.a. terms which get tied up with a sort of time warp; a paradox, maybe? The HVRA has an exemplary committee, a fantastic drive to improve situations, superb Road Representatives, experienced officers. And all are absolute stalwarts doing what they perceive is the right thing to do at the right time. The Village is superb too. We look forward to seeing you at the AGM on 17<sup>th</sup>May in the small hall when there will be a lot more to tell you. # People Before Us 5a

### Sir Harold Hartley and Benjamin Seebohm Rowntree

Both these two eminent men signed the Covenant for the land to be used for the Village Hall and Covenant for the Field Conveyance. How strange that they were both appointed during World War I by David Lloyd George to the Ministry of Munitions; Seebohm Rowntree as Director of the Welfare Department, rightly chosen in 1915-18 for his impetus in the family chocolate and cocoa firm for improving working conditions in factories, bringing in pensions, better wages and five day weeks and the "Human Factor in Business". He was also a chemist. He died in High Wycombe in 1954. He appears in some village photographs.

Sir Harold Hartley served in both World Wars. His time at the Ministry of Munitions 1918-1919 just overlapped with Seebohm Rowntree but he was Controller of the Chemical Warfare Department. He was an amazing research chemist and biological scientist whose knowledge and experience covered several disciplines. He chaired at least 21 National Commissions, conferences, Executive Councils, Research and Advisory Boards.

These included chemistry, gas, oil, and chemical warfare, electricity in a big way, flight and railways. He was invited into The Royal Society, gained a Knighthood and war medals including the George Cross (and much more).

Born in 1890, he died in 1978. For some years he lived at Boss Lane Farm. He too signed the Covenant for the Village Hall for the Village to have a meeting place and was instrumental that the village had a recreation field. Eric Gill from Piggots and other local residents whose signatures were just as important also enabled us to have the facilities that we are privileged to enjoy.

On a lighter note, did you ever see the Hughenden Happy Gang in action? They evolved from the WI, with husbands and friends joining them in

1979. They kept audiences amused and almost instantly found themselves in great demand.

They became very popular and also charged no fee. They mainly entertained elderly audiences who needed cheering up. They took their light hearted shows to day centres, community centres, Over 60's clubs, Hard of Hearing, blind or challenged audiences. They always enjoyed themselves, changing costumes in any available laundry room, corridor, church or uncurtained stage. Hughenden Valley certainly saw them and joined in their songs with an accompanist at the piano, if it worked. They did 400 performances all over South Bucks and always went on the Village Day floats.

The Happy Gang kept going until at least 1992. Several present residents will remember having parents in the Happy Gang-genuine fun, much quick thinking on stage and many favourite songs,

# Parish Council Update - Focus on Youth

For a couple of years we have tried to find ways of providing entertainment, enjoyment and engagement with young people in the Hughenden area. We know that most, if they are able to, go into the Wycombe area for events but could we possibly provide something locally, perhaps even provided and led by young people that means that there is choice of these sorts of things on our very own doorstep?

There are options through National Citizen Service (NCS) see details at the bottom of this article and a number of other organisations but it would be good to find some 12-18yr olds who would like to get together to work out what events and items we might organise locally.

In the recent Parish Plan the area of events for young people in the parish was an issue and I think it's only through their engagement with this that a suitable programme can be drawn up.

Last year the Village Hall were good enough to pay for the Youth Bus to come during the Summer Holidays — it's working out whether this is the type of thing that people want and will support that will be important.
