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Chairman's Welcome

At the end of my Chairman's Welcome in the Spring Edition I had indicated that it would be my final report. 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Hughenden Valley's Rare Chalk Grassland

Since our last report in February, the Conservation Group has remained busy with scrub clearance and tree management. We have now reached a stage where we are pretty much back on track with the management plan, after the unavoidable delays of the previous two seasons.

Second only in importance to the late summer grass cut and clearance (required to keep the soil fertility low) the scrub and undergrowth clearance is needed to halt the chalk grassland reverting to woodland. Starting at ground level we work to reduce particularly the growth of dogwood, brambles and rosebay willow herb: these all spread rapidly, not simply by seeding but by root-spread, suckering and (for brambles) by the re-rooting of branches wherever they touch the ground. Added to these invaders and the ever-growing grass there is the annual re-growth of nettles, selfseeded hawthorn, blackthorn, maple, willow and oak seedlings: all these join the non-stop cycle.

The under-storey of low bushes and young trees includes the ubiquitous thorns, maples, and willows along with a scattering of young ash trees (before they succumb to die-back), wild roses, wild cherry, apples, honeysuckle, viburnum and wild privet. This growth is kept in check by

cutting back selected areas to make bays and other sheltered glades to let in light (to encourage wildflowers and improve the habitat for small mammals, insects etc.). Additionally, opening up "rides" - wide pathways to ease movement and open up vistas for visitors - contributes to diversity of the environment while achieving a major part of the management plan.

Management of the upper storey of taller and mature trees involves a programme of selective felling, pollarding and coppicing. As an area of chalk grassland, the number of trees should not be left to increase unchecked, nor should non-native species be encouraged or allowed to flourish. The aim is to allow a habitat with healthy trees of various ages to enhance and contribute to the grassland environment. Pollarding and coppicing are traditional techniques which maintain the health and greatly extend the life of individual trees whilst also contributing to the sustainability and on-going management of an area. Properly undertaken on a rolling programme, pollarded and coppiced trees would historically have provided all an area's requirements for fence posts and bindings for laid hedges and fences, large poles for plant supports, material for shelters (both animal and human), and for firewood. Our group has recently spent time creating a laid hedge in part of the southern boundary of the area. Altogether we spent three weeks (3x3-hour sessions) creating a stretch of new hedge requiring only produce from the chalk bank itself; not a rail, nail, or piece of string was brought in from elsewhere. We intend to continue with this thoroughly rewarding job in the future.



The stars of our conservation effort are also appearing now: the bank's flush of orchids, mainly pyramid and common spotted varieties. This already seems to be a good year for these delicate beauties and not only in their usual places ... several of the areas we have cleared over the last two seasons now have new blooms. They of course have not seeded in these places but will have been lying


dormant under thick grass and shademaking undergrowth; they have simply been waiting for the open grassland environment to be recreated. We claim some degree of success for our efforts!! Even more surprising is the appearance in one of our newly opened glades, of a Twaeblade orchid. Only one bloom has been seen so far: it has managed to grow sufficiently to rise above the rapidly competing dogwood shoots. However, this one example of the quite rare Twaeblade shows that it is likely there will be more in coming seasons as we continue keeping down the dogwood etc. Our photograph of the current bloom is regrettably unimpressive but is included here to prove its existence. Clearer pictures are available on the web.

Also of interest, nearby but not in our patch, there is an area of developing broad-leaved Helleborine orchids. They will not flower for another two or three weeks but should be a nice sight when they do. Being in a different environment from our chalk grassland they are unlikely to spread our way but it is good to know that the area is still capable of showing its historical diversity.

On behalf of the Village Hall Management, we hope that you will visit this special location. Even if you were only to stand and look around you, we are convinced that you would be awestruck by the beauty of Hughenden Valley. If you also look at your feet you are more than likely to also be in the presence of at least one type of orchid. It may even be a rare orchid – so please tread lightly but visit nonetheless.

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
The Great Escape – The Investigation

When my father left school he started as a cub reporter on a local newspaper in Cornwall. By the time the Second World War started he was an experienced interviewer and shorthand writer. This, apparently, made him a prime candidate for the RAF Police which he joined in 1940.

After his death in 1996 we found two shorthand notebooks and several photos of members of RAF Police Special Investigation Branch (SIB) taken in Germany after the war. As my father had never spoken about his involvement in the war, we had no idea of the significance of the material. We did know that he spoke German fluently. One page in particular – with a sketch of a gallows on it – made me want to find out more.

I found a clue in the citation for his British Empire Medal: "... he was specially selected to be one of the team of investigators engaged in bringing to justice the Germans responsible for the murder of fifty Royal Air Force officer POWs." This was following what became known as 'The Great Escape', when 76 prisoners escaped from Stalag Luft 3 POW camp. Only three managed to evade capture but the escape caused huge disruption to the German war effort. As a result Hitler personally ordered the execution of fifty escapees as a warning to others.

Ten years ago I offered the notebooks to the Imperial War Museum (IWM) with a view to getting them transcribed. They were very



interested but found the cost prohibitively expensive. Then last year I tried again and offered to look for help. The notebooks were scanned and I asked for volunteers on The Great Escape and Hughenden Facebook pages. There was a lot of interest and several offers of help. Currently there are five volunteers working on the transcription, which is about 75% complete. (It will never be 100% as some is impossible to read.)

When completed the IWM will make them available to researchers/historians.

The Great Escape - Transcribing the Shorthand Notes


I was one of the volunteers who answered Chris's call for help on the Hughenden Facebook Page last December and I remember when he sent a cluster of pages along with a note to apologize for the gruesome drawing. As I was curious, I quickly scrolled down the pages to see the upside-down gallows!! You may be wondering what the outlines immediately above it say:


"Dr Absalon has been friendly with a woman Frau Dentz aged about 38, at a house where there is a....drawing of the gallows." (Dr Absalon was a top Nazi.)

Another page that set my heart racing began: "Killing of 50 RAF

date, which is generally relied upon, is the fact that these 50 officers with 28 others escaped from Stalag Luft 3, Sagan, on the night of the 24/25th March 1944. The murdered Officers were arrested at places near Gorlitz, Liegnitz, Harzburg, Regensburg, Saarbrücken and Danzig. It is expected /accepted that orders for their destruction were made at high level of the German command during a conference on the particular/broad subject of escapees, including these airmen, when Hitler, Himmler, Goering and Keitel were present." (The words underlined denote a query in transcription.)

I feel privileged to have had the opportunity to transcribe Chris's father's shorthand notes written over 75 years ago recording the numerous interviews of captured "Obersturmbannführers, Kriminal Kommissärs and many other topranking Nazi and Gestapo Officers, some of whom were transferred to the London Cage, located in Kensington Palace Gardens, for further interrogation.

However, one of my recent transcriptions has revealed that a top Nazi by the name of Seetzen "unfortunately committed suicide by having Cyanide Potassium immediately after his arrest and whilst on the way to military detention."

For me personally, this has been an intriguing journey, one that has kept me up late at night Googling lots of German or Polish place names and WW 11 events, and it's like completing a giant jig-saw puzzle that is frustrating at times because I have really struggled to decipher some outlines that do not follow the rules of shorthand or were made up for speed. I have also struggled to read

some of the place names and lists of those being interviewed written in long-hand and have resorted to asking Chris for help. After all, when his father wrote these notes, he did not expect others to read them 75+ years later! AMAZING!

The sharp-eyed amongst you may have spotted a slight inconsistency between Chris's and Rosemary's reports. Chris says that there were 76 escapees, but Rosemary's transcription shows "50 officers and 28 others", making 78.

Chris has found this clarification "...it is widely believed that 76 made it away from Stalag Luft III; three were captured at the exit to 'Harry' so essentially 79 made it out of the tunnel. There were others actually in the tunnel but they weren't classified as 'escapers' until they'd left the tunnel."

Which illustrates one of the challenges of studying history!

## A Walk to the North of Hughenden

Around Hughenden we have excellent walking country and one of our residents has offered to write up a series of walks for the magazine. Don't be shy, if you have a favourite walk that you would like to write about please let us know.

Ideas for walks abound,
Buckinghamshire Council (BC) is
promoting its "Simply Walk"
programme, there is also the national
Slow Ways project. (see the notes at
the end of this article).

Distance: 3.2 miles / 5 km
Terrain: Open fields, woodland
Accessibility: kissing gates, no stiles
Elevation: 80m climb overall

From the car park opposite The Harrow Pub, take the gate into the adjacent field and set off up the path to the end of the field. Once you reach the top of this path and the hedgerow, go through the gate straight ahead of you into the next field. This path is significantly steeper, but only for a short stretch. Once you are level with the trees to the right of the path, almost at the crest of the hill, it is well worth turning around to admire the view across Hughenden Valley (for as long as it takes you to get your breath and rest your legs!) You will now be ready to continue the much flatter section of this field which continues to afford fine views to your right and left, as you approach Piggott's Wood. Take the gate directly in front of you into the woods.



Once in the woods, do not take the left hand path, but the one going roughly straight on, to keep going in the direction you have already been following. You will meet various path junctions as you walk, but keep following the forwards path whenever there is a choice. The woods will always remain fairly dense to your left for the first half of this walk through the woods but at times you will be able to see a field not far away to your right and towards the end of Piggott's Wood, Bryant's Bottom down the valley on your right.

Eventually, you will have no choice but to take a right turn down to the village of Bryant's Bottom or to follow the path round, but still within, the far end of the wood. Follow this path as it bends left. Once more you will soon be met with the same scenario. Again, do not take the path to the right, but follow it as it skirts around to the left. After a short incline, you may be aware that the path has the edge of a garden on the right and you will soon meet a junction of footpaths. If you look right, you will see the end of a road. Don't take the right turn, go straight on! The path becomes more of a meandering path than a 'straight on' one, but keep going forwards at any forks until you reach a junction with the edge of some buildings in front of you. There

is a footpath hard left, a straight on / leftish path which follows the edge of the buildings or a right-hand path which leads out of the woods towards some dwellings. Take the hard left footpath. After following this downhill, you will meet a junction where you can turn left or right; turn right. You are now actually on the original path that you took when you came into the wood! Follow this path until you reach the kissing gate that takes you out of the wood and into an open field. You are now facing the right way to admire the view of Hughenden Valley all the way through this field as you descend towards the long field that will take you back to the start of the walk.

A recent Ofsted inspection in May 2022 highlighted the journey the school has been on and recognised the hard work and determination of the current staff team to ensure the school provides an excellent education and we are all extremely pleased that this was recognised in the inspection report. Last week, Year 6 went on a residential trip to the Isle of Wight and we were all satisfied when we came back as we had a blasting time and many stories to tell!


First, we came to school with all our luggage on Monday 6th June and we came to the class because we had to wait for the coach to arrive. After a few minutes we went to the front of

## Look Up in July; What to See

Did you see the Full Moon on Wednesday 13th July and were you struck by how big it looked? This is known as a Super Moon because it is both at its closest approach to the Earth as well as being Full. It is easy to think of the Moon's orbit around the Earth as being perfectly circular. It is actually elliptical so the Earth -Moon distance varies and the Moon's speed varies as the Moon follows its orbit. Astronomers call the closest approach perigee, the Moon is moving at its fastest at this point. Then for about a fortnight it slows down till it gets farthest away, called apogee.

The photograph below by William Leighton is of Noctilucent Clouds seen from Naphill. These are wispy very high altitude clouds of ice crystals which are illuminated by the Sun's rays well after sunset or before sunrise throughout the summer or winter. William took this picture at between 02:45 and 03:45 on Sunday 12th June. The Noctilucent season is between late-May and early-August with July an excellent time to look out for these elusive clouds.

There is one sky phenomenon you will never be able to see; that is the astrological description of the Sun being in a particular constellation or sign of the Zodiac. If you can see the



Sun you will not be able to see the constellation because it will be daytime; if you can see the particular constellation in question it will actually be night-time. Interestingly, astrologers have now had to admit that there is a thirteenth zodiacal sign, namely Ophiuchus.

Hence "all-tall-girls-cavorting-look-very-like-several-old-septuagenarian-carthorhorses-at-play".

The majority of the refugees arrive with only the clothes they stand-up in. Consequently, the Charity has established a "New2You" shop, providing a range of clothing, shoes, underwear and school uniforms.

## EUNICE'S LEGACY, THE TRIMFONE RHAPSODY AND DREAMS OF AVOCADOS

Early June 2022. Just past Platinum Jubilee celebrations, which luckily took place in fine weather. I'm looking out on the garden which is quite lush (including the lawn which happily takes advantage of No-Mow May). That said, it's not surprising that all is lush.....this remains a spring time that continues to feel like early March: below average temperatures, especially overnight; higher than normal rainfall (admittedly catching-up from an early spring drought) and still too much threat of high winds from the conveyor belt of storms blowing in from the west. The only thing that doesn't make you believe it's still March is that we are not waking up to frost. Just think, in only a couple of weeks we'll be past the equinox. Yes folks, the nights will be drawing in!!!!.

Amongst the ericaceous plants only the azalea has flowered; the camelia, gardenia and pieris have failed. The quince flowered beautifully but has set no fruit (2nd year running). In the greenhouse the Strelitzia is still alive – it really needs to come outside for the summer but.... The orange tree

has just come outside, it has recently blossomed prolifically but it too will appreciate the outdoors to help last year's fruit to swell. The avocados are the healthiest looking of the lot!!!! I still don't expect fruit, that would surely be too much to hope for, but if nothing else it demonstrates the tenacity of plant life, even in less-than-ideal conditions.

The crazy birds do at least seem to be happy. I don't know off-hand the life span of blackbirds but we've still got the joy of Oberon, our jazz blackbird, playing variations on a theme and putting in the frequent ring of a Trimfone. Put it this way, it's either the original Oberon or he was an inspiring teacher to the following generation because it's now the third season of his "Trimfone Rhapsody" – very Charlie Parker.

It seems to have been an exceptional year for the great tits. Over the last couple of weeks, we have seen adult birds leading fledglings to our birdfeeder alternately feeding them bits of fat ball and then showing them how to get into the feeders. We seem to have had two separate families over recent days and with the numbers of nesting adults we have seen already we expect more to come. The Fifth-columnist jackdaws

continue to undertake raids on the fat balls but, oddly, they seem to leave more for other birds than in previous years. Sharing Jackdaws!! Who said I anthropomorphised my garden birds?? The house sparrows continue their upward march to increased population with many nesting pairs in the hedges and shrubbery; they continually patrol the patio picking up bits of food the other birds don't find.

## The HAGA programme:

In the last article (February) we reported that our programme was at last back on track: we had had our first talk of the year and were expecting to continue with February's talk and then the AGM in March.

Then we met Eunice.... she took an instant dislike to the Village Hall's roof and trees in the car park and put a halt to any business in the hall until mid-May. HAGA decided to halt our programme altogether since it was too difficult to temporarily re-locate and re-schedule speakers etc. while the hall was repaired.

Hence, our first meeting since the hall's reopening took place on 27 May, a combined AGM and social evening. We had a very good turn out, and it is clear that membership continues at an encouraging level. Debi Hoare has retired from the post

of programme secretary after several years solid service to HAGA; the membership expressed their thanks and sent best wishes to Debi as she is taking the chance to spend more time nearer to her family. We also welcomed two members onto the Committee: Jo Keach and Barrie Tackley have joined the social subcommittee.

As we promised in earlier reports, annual membership for new members is again being held at the pre-lockdown level of £10 (existing members have been rolling-over their membership because of the covid years). For some time now, one of the main priorities of the Hughenden Valley Climate Group has been to promote and enhance the verdant countryside we are surrounded by and in particular, to encourage residents to create a bee corridor through the Valley via our wildflower seed campaign at the Village Shop.

On a larger scale, we hope to create visually pleasing wildflower areas that will not only attract pollinators but that will make a bold statement of intent as well as acting as a traffic calming measure.

This is an ambitious plan but many local Parishes have already started pushing ahead with rewilding and reducing verge cutting - our nearest being Hazlemere Parish Council who declared a climate emergency back in 2020 and set up a working party to look into this. In connection with the Bee Squared campaign, Hazlemere Parish Council have started work on an area in Brackely Road as a pilot and are looking into other parishowned land which might be used for rewilding.

With this in mind, the Climate Group are pleased to report that they have recently met both the new Hughenden Parish Council and Resident's Association to discuss the creation of a handful of prominent areas around the Valley which show that areas of rewilding can be created without looking messy or impeding the vision of pedestrians, cyclists and motorists.

Hughenden Valley Climate Group are also proud to let you know that we have managed to secure a copse of 30 trees for Hughenden Primary School as well as hedgerow for the Village Hall. Two separate applications were made to the Woodland Trust as part of The Queen's Green Canopy scheme for the recent Jubilee celebrations and we are just so pleased that they were accepted. Trees and hedging will arrive in late Autumn and we may need some help with planting .....!

### HS<sub>2</sub>

Although we don't appear to be suffering any direct impact on HV from HS2, the project is going ahead and growing.

As well as development along the course of the new line, there are several other aspects of the HS2 development that may impact us as we live and travel in Bucks. For example Buckinghamshire Council (BC) is awaiting a full response from HS2 about damage to the aquifers and chalk streams.

The BC web page (https://www.buckinghamshire.gov.uk/parking-roads-and-transport/high-speed-rail/) sets out the Council's position on this development. There is lots of information on that page and I would urge you to check it out. It makes clear that this work could go on for 10 years. Given the track record of other big infrastructure projects I think that 10 years is optimistic.



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## The Purchase of Hughenden Manor (1848)

John Veysey writes about Benjamin Disraeli's acquisition of the Manor Estate.

It seems that it was not that straight forward. The asking price was £35,000 and it was only through an advance of £25,000 from two friends that Disraeli was able to write to his wife in 1848..."It is all done, you are now the Lady of Hughenden"

Mr Vevsey goes on to write:

There is little doubt from his writings that he loved Hughenden Valley and the surrounding countryside with the wooded hills. One October he wrote "the limes are golden, the beeches ruddy brown while the oaks and elms and pines are still dark green and contrast well with the brighter tints". In Spring he notes "the rosy may, the primroses (his own flower) and the cooing of the pigeons and the sultry note of the cuckoo". Scenes such as these can be witnessed still today

"It is all done, you are now the Lady of Hughenden" (except that the large elms are no longer with us).

> The manor house underwent a considerable change with extensive building under the direction of EP Lamb, with the approval of Mrs Disraeli. Ornamental parapets were built and a new exterior of brickwork added; in fact, the house became the imposing mansion we know today. The gardens and grounds also underwent change. There was Mrs Disraeli's German Forest to the north of the house and her idea of the wide stone terrace adorned in the Italian style. Peacocks were introduced and it is recorded that Disraeli caught a 4½ lb trout in the stream!

## Police Independent Advisory Groups

Police Independent Advisory Groups (IAGs) are a partnership and communication link between the police and the community. They consist of representative residents with an interest in how the police are operating in their areas, and police representatives who are seeking feedback and advice from residents on how their activities are viewed. It is hoped that in this way problems can be spotted before they escalate.

Generally, each Local Police Area (LPA) has an IAG that meets regularly to discuss current issues. There is also a Strategic Independent Advisory Group at the Force level (SIAG) that discusses strategic issues with senior police representatives. So the Wycombe LPA (covering HV) has an IAG and Thames Valley Police (TVP) has a SIAG based in its headquarters in Kiddlington.

The knowledge of the existence and role of IAGs by residents has been limited until now, but we are keen to raise awareness and promote their work.

Recently a National Association of IAGs has been set up which is keen to spread best practice, so I will provide further information in future editions of the newsletter.

It was a truly wonderful way to thank and pay tribute to Her Majesty for 70 years of dedicated duty, unwavering service and profound commitment to her country and Commonwealth.

I was also very pleased to learn that the Hughenden Village Hall has reopened after the roof was blown off during Storm Eunice. The rapid progress that was made to repair the roof is testament to the efforts of the local community, as I saw on my visit to the site a few days after the storm.

Back in Westminster, I've continued to raise local people's concerns with individual ministers and on the floor of the House of Commons. I recently spoke in the Parliamentary debate on the Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill, which aims to create opportunities for people wherever they live. I very much support this aspiration, but like many local people who wrote to me, was concerned at some of the implications for planning policy. I am therefore glad that ministers have listened to our comments and dropped the zonal planning proposal, ensuring we can protect our precious green spaces for future generations.

With summer now upon us, I hope you can spend some time with family and friends and enjoy Hughenden's lovely surroundings in the weeks ahead.

### **Sewers and Drains**

## Sewers

We continue to follow up with Thames Water on their plans for improving our sewage system. There are essentially two types of plan.

Firstly, there is the DWMP (Drainage and Wastewater Management Plan). This is a 25 year rolling infrastructure

plan covering the Little Marlow catchment area, of which the valley is a part. This follows the BRAVA workshop where the DIG reported



the Hughenden Valley Flooding Risks, and which we hope will be taken into account when the new plans are formulated.

A review of the plan is expected in July 2022. This will be accompanied by a 'Catchment Strategy Plan'. We understand that the results of this planning will be built into the 2025-2030 business plan, which we hope will include large scale infrastructure changes to bring our sewage system properly into the 21st century.

Secondly, there is the GISMP (Groundwater Impacted System Management Plan). This means plans for dealing with groundwater

entering the sewage system. Last year's TW works in Warrendene Rd carried out sealing of tops but also lined 139 metres of sewer. The DIG put it to Thames Water that the lower part of the valley should be lined to de-risk flooding events. This has been put to Thames Water, but their response is that they have no evidence of water ingress in this area, and so have no plans to carry out further lining in Hughenden Valley at this stage. However, they report that additional monitors are being installed across the catchment and the ongoing GISMP work being carried out is improving the resilience of the system.

### **Drains**

There had been reports of water seeping through the road surface near the foot of Cryers Hill, and about 50 metres along towards High Wycombe. On a very wet day, we eventually spotted water bubbling up in the hedge on the pumping station side of the road, behind the bus stop. On closer inspection this turned out to be a sizeable culvert, but which was almost entirely blocked up and clearly had not been cleaned out for years. We reported this via FixMyStreet and this is now completely resolved.

Meet the Neighbours

In this edition of the Hughenden News we feature a neighbour who needs very little introduction - "The Harrow". We hope that you find this interesting and find out something new.

Hughenden Valley didn't really exist as a village until the 1890's, and prior to then was rather more a spot on the map comprising scattered farms and cottages. Going back into prehistory local people would have gathered to socialise with an enterprising individual brewing ales at some point and perhaps selling them from their cottage. This is perhaps how the Harrow pub was born.

The Harrow pub has been serving our community since 1471, a charming

brick and flint building with oak beams and a low ceiling that has managed to retain its charm and relevance to the current day. We know that the oldest parts containing the large fireplace had an oven where bread and meat were prepared for customers. Today the Harrow still exudes its history but is modernised and leads a busy life serving the village.

Karen Norton breezily welcomed Carolyn and me to the pub on the start of her busiest week of the year



leading up to the Jubilee celebrations. This was for an informal interview for this article, which Karen was more than happy to help us with.

She has been at the pub for eleven years, the last five of which she has had the heady responsibility of owning the lease to the pub from the Heineken brewery. Keeping a pub going through these troubled times is an enormous responsibility and we asked her the secrets of achieving this.

Her ethos is simple – she wants the pub to be at the heart of the village, a social hub which is open to everyone. That means providing a warm welcome for friends and families and their dogs for drinks and good, reasonably priced fresh food (which includes vegan and gluten free). In support of this the pub carries activities such as a weekly guiz and are now bringing back musical events plus the barbecue is now refurbished and being put to good use. The pub additionally offers private functions and charitable events in support of the community. Karen is just taking up sponsorship of the HV children's football teams.

Covid was an awful time for everyone – so how did the pub cope under lockdown? It was, of course, a financially difficult period. However,


Karen launched into the Eat Out to Help Out scheme with relish, which was a lifeline and enabled the pub to serve food again. Additionally, the pub did a takeaway service which was very popular. Even as things started to improve, it was difficult tempting customers back into the pub, but bit by bit the pub is getting there.

During the recent closure of the Village Hall playground following the storm damage Karen allowed local children to use the pub play facilities at any time.

Karen leads a happy team, and regards her staff as family. She prefers to employ local people and likes nothing more than when a team member goes off to Uni and is then replaced by a younger sibling. It may be a busy environment, but the team copes well in exceptional circumstances. Recently, a wedding party of sixteen fresh from their wedding service rocked up without notice and asked if they could hold an impromptu wedding breakfast there!! The team managed just fine providing hot food and drinks – amazing really!

So, is the Harrow haunted we asked? No says Karen, it's rather too warming and friendly for that, but there has been the odd glass found broken on the floor when she's come down in the morning, so who knows? There is also the story of the Denner Hill Sandstone – the large stone that sits at the foot of the Harrow pub sign. Some years ago, the stone mysteriously vanished around the time that an earlier landlord moved on to another pub. A little while later, the stone magically reappeared at the Harrow, and it has remained there ever since. It goes to show there is some justice in this world.


