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

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Co-Chairman's Report

We were very pleased to be asked to take on a fourth year as Co-chairs. That is quite something; a chance to continue with both the day to day Residents Association matters and the unexpected ones.

The present HVRA Officers re-elected at the AGM were:

Co-Chair Angus and Janet Idle

Vice Chairman Jerry Morley
Secretary Rosemary Hewitt
Treasurer Peter Cannon

Al Bowyer, who wished to stand down after nine years as Treasurer, was greatly thanked. It is also hoped to replace David and Susan Sharp with three Road Reps for Friars Gardens as there are nearly 100 houses in that estate.

At the AGM there were four questions from the floor:

- 1. What is the position now for the Multi-use Games Area?
- 2. What is the progress of the proposed cycle path to/from Wycombe?
- 3. How much signage is required for the surgery; is it over-signed?
- 4. How many Road Reps do we still need?

Briefly, the MUGA, although all the directives from Wycombe District Council (and there were many) have been accepted, however there is still a parking problem. The number of parking bays at the Village Hall were deemed insufficient by Bucks County Council' Highways Department and so, until that matter is resolved.

The planning application was withdrawn (not rejected) for now. As it is such a popular requirement it will at some stage be put forward again for reconsideration.

In answer to the cycle path question and since the A4128 has become so much more busy now, a small group will gather, with Wycombe District Council representatives, when the Hughenden Quarter project is completed.

Signage. Road signage for the Surgery is a matter for Wycombe District Council with whom we will liaise.

At least two new Road Reps are needed for Friars Gardens since David and Susan Sharp retired at the AGM. In Valley Road there is at least one other stretch where extra support may be needed. There are several suggestions being considered, so watch this space.

Our Website is being restructured, and thanks to Andrew Capey a potential plan for the website will be out soon after all the ideas with a small sub-group have been analysed,

The Minutes of the 2017 AGM will, as usual, be delivered next April in time for the 2018 AGM.

We were very pleased to have two guest speakers from the Royal Air Force at our AGM. One of them was Dave Brown who is a historian and the Curator of The Bomber Harris Room and Tunnels at Bomber Command. He brought smiles to those familiar with the local and national history of World War II. The other guest was James Palfrey, who gave an update on RAF High Wycombe now. Unfortunately the Shop Committee members missed the speakers 'talk' and had to leave to go to their own meeting which they delayed to come to our AGM.

The June Committee meeting of the HVRA covered many items, most of which will be covered again in the July Meeting.

We are planning to have a three hour First Aid Course given by representatives of The St. John's Ambulance, for those wanting to learn more about essential First Aid techniques. There will be a certificate of attendance for those who take the course. Please contact us as soon as possible, if you are interested.

Bucks Street Representatives Association. Our Road Reps' system is a well established and envied system. The Bucks Street Association has been formed as a similar but complementary system which is County-wide and aims to give support to vulnerable people. In our village it will work

alongside our Road Reps. In fact, each of our Road Reps, if they choose, can decide to be both Road and Street Reps; hopefully they will, as that would be the simplest solution. If however they choose to remain just as Road Reps that will not matter much, as they will liaise with whoever is the Neighbourhood Watch or Street Rep. Whichever way, it will give us the best of both systems. Our Road Reps have already been given useful information packs by the Street Association for crime reporting, in particular how to deal with the now widespread scams that try to trick people, especially the vulnerable ones. The Co-Chair and Natalie Judson of the Street Association have discussed this and are happy with the two approaches to this.

Lastly, the Senior Citizens' Treat in June went very well. It was lovely to see so many elderly residents looking so spritely and very cheerful. There was much effort by the ones who are afflicted by age or health difficulties and the helpers were impressed with their determination. The entertainment, given by the father and son duo (father Gavin and son Tom), "The Moles" was excellent. Incidentally Gavin used to live in Trees Avenue before they moved to Lacey Green. Tom went to school, first at Hughenden Valley First School before going on to Great Kingshill School and the Royal Grammar School. He wants to be a professional opera singer.

Enjoy the Summer whatever the weather; it seems to be changing again. At the moment we just crave some gentle summer rain for a while.

Our Village is going European (For the 1991 Village Day). However John Veysey made an impressive King Henry at a Medieval Banquet in the Village Hall.

Bryants Bottom Rejoins the Residents Association. They were welcomed back and a year later had four Road Reps.

Rosemary Hewitt organised the Senior Citizens' Annual Party. Children from Great Kingshill School helped to welcome the guests and served them all, as well as taking part in the entertainment, along with the West Wycombe Brass Band, St.Wulfston's Church choir and Mrs. Shepherd's Children's Drama Group.

St. Michael's Church organised "Street Eyes Lookout"; Street Representatives from the church *in every road*, as the eyes and ears of the Church. The Vicar Rev John Eastgate emphasised that they are there to help all. See Street Association on page 26

Summer 1992 - What the Residents Association does. By Ted Holliman.

"So what does the Residents' Association do for the Village? some of our Road Reps have been asked when collecting subscriptions".

"Its constitution gives three answers.

- 1. It was first established to successfully fight planning proposals to in-fill the land between us and Naphill with houses, and it still continues to monitor planning proposals and send comments to the Parish and District Councils.
- 2. To promote and encourage community spirit and social activities.
- 3. To watch the interests of residents and raise any problems on their behalf with the authorities concerned.

It is a member of both the Chiltern and Wycombe Societies and with them keeps a watchful eye on local planning applications. It is a regular contributor to the Wycombe Hospital Scannappeal (1992), and since its foundation in 1966 has given financial support to many local groups and clubs.

In 1991 a substantial donation was made to the Village Hall Kitchen Appeal, and the current efforts to raise money to build a new entrance hall will have its full support.

The 100 Club organises parties and theatre visits for all senior citizens - they do not need to be a member of the Association - and HRA helps with the running costs of the Good Companions.

Your Road Rep. is a vital link in the Association and will always pass on to the committee any suggestions, comments or criticisms you may have.

The idea is to collect information about all the village's assets and deficits, problems, residents' likes, dislikes, suggestions, complaints etc; a kind of Doomesday book of Hughenden Valley! The results will be collated into a document which can be used for future planning locally; village projects, and also for use in evidence to higher authorities when necessary. (eg. traffic studies and planning applications)". Sadly Ted Holliman died shortly after writing this.

Having read Ted's article I am sure you will agree that he would have been most interested in such a project, as essentially it seeks to quantify in a single document the essence of what he wrote.

There have recently been a few period power cuts affecting Hughenden Valley and Bryants Bottom. These faults have been remedied relatively quickly and efficiently. When experiencing one of these cuts please phone the Power Failure number 0800 072 7282 immediately as that can help to get the power restored more quickly. To ensure that you are not affected by an outage it might be a good idea to switch off electrical equipment which is usually kept on stand-by, because sudden faults can occur, particularly when you are not at home.

Dog-poo has been a relevant topic of ours several times before. Wherever you walk your dog or other people's dogs please use the dog-poo bins provided in fields, woods, parks, footpaths and recreation grounds or dispose of it in its bag at home when you return. If you think that there are not enough bins provided please campaign for more, but remember that somebody has to keep the bins emptied. Dog-poo has some ingredients that can harm sheep, horses and other wildlife; it can even kill horses. Parish Councillor Update

It will come as no surprise to read that the last few months have been quite an eye-opener! Getting to grips with the many things that a Parish Council has responsibility for is still very much a 'work in progress' as the sheer diversity is impressive.

In May I had the opportunity to get involved in some of the sub-committees and working groups that deal with the various aspects of Parish Council work. As a newcomer I am keen to learn whilst not over-committing! One of the key roles of any parish council is the provision of allotments and I was delighted to become Chair of the Allotments Liaison Sub-committee which met on 10th May. With 8 allotment sites providing some 255 plots there are significant differences between the locations. If you have visited the Hughenden Valley allotments you will know that this is a challenging site given the slope it sits upon! That said, the Cryers Hill site has its challenges – the first being

where it is exactly! Allotments play an important part in the role of a parish council as this is one of the reasons that these councils exist. Hughenden has many more allotments than our neighbour Hazlemere Parish Council which has around 60. With around 90% occupancy and a growing interest in growing vegetables it would be great if all the allotments were in use. I do sympathise with active allotment holders who are blighted by uncultivated neighbouring plots. This is something we will be discussing in July.

I am gradually visiting each site and hope to complete this task by mid-July when the sub-committee reconvenes. I have only admiration for anyone who has an allotment and it is lovely chatting to our tenants while I continue to learn a lot about what to grow and when! My dog, Oscar, would happily help manage the rabbit problem although I am not so keen that he does so! They *are* a pest and we will be looking at what can be done to manage this in a humane way.

In August the annual Allotment Competition will return and we are lucky to have the highly experienced Frank Parge, retired Head Gardener of Hughenden Manor, once again leading the judging panel. There are some interesting changes from last year so do check the notice board at your allotment site or visit the Parish Council website:

(<u>www.hughendenparishcouncil.org.uk</u>) and Facebook page (search Hughenden Parish Council). I am looking forward to the Award Ceremony in the autumn when Frank will again share his wisdom to what I am sure will be an appreciative audience if the feedback from last year is anything to go by!

Can Your Body Heal Itself?

Of course it can. When you cut yourself the evidence is obvious. We know that all animals have the ability to repair themselves to a lesser or greater extent. This is called regeneration and a good example of how we regenerate is the ability to repair damaged skin. We know that our bones and muscles and even nerve fibres can repair themselves. What a marvellous piece of work our body is. No robot comes near it.

There are more self-help books on the market than you can count and the cream of academia have piled in to telling us what our bodies can and cannot do.

We know what the body really cannot do. For example, if you break your leg and have a bone protruding from the body, the body will never put that bone back in to place without help. No amount of mind of matter will do it. We understand this.

There is now so much focus in the media about the role of exercise in relieving or curing pain and chronic conditions of all kinds but the dependency on drugs is still high. Why? I believe that we have developed a culture of dependency and drugs represent in our minds a "quick" fix.

We know, however, that the side effects of drugs are sometimes worse than the problem itself and a sufferer can end up taking one drug to counteract the negative effects of another drug. Some doctors may prescribe drugs just because they know that the patient expects to be given something *real* and not sent away with good advice about how to live his or her life.

Exercise, however is not always the golden road. For example, you may be walking uphill and be struck by chest pain. Once you stop walking the pain goes. This may be angina of effort, and announcement by the heart that it can no longer pump enough blood around the body in response to the energy demand of walking uphill. As time goes by the arteries continue to clog and the maximum blood flow drops.

If untreated then you might not even be able to stand up. Clearly exercise in those circumstances would be dangerous and your doctor will examine the causes with you perhaps focusing on an unhealthy diet which may have caused the problem in the first place. So no, exercise is not always the golden road.

I like to think of having a partnership with our doctor. Our doctor is there to keep me healthy instead of trying to fix me when it is too late. If the doctor can take a holistic view then I have a really good chance of staying healthy as the advice will be preventative and treatment will be the last resort. In fact if there is a true partnership then an annual visit to the doctor for a body check up should be a celebration as his or her advice has contributed to my health.

You will all have your own strong views on the role of doctors and alternative therapies . The Japanese seem to have a saying for everything but I like the one that translates as *Keep your mind open and learn*. I believe that it is not a question of either the doctor or a therapy. It is a combination of both that can lead to good health as long as we can avoid the crackpots lurking in the web offering alternatives that are just stupid.

Well what do I know about pain? Pain is so individual and complex that the sensation of pain itself seems to affect the whole of the body. Persistent pain equals fear. If you experience an unexpected pain then fear is normal. What will be the consequence for the future you ask yourself? Fear generates anxiety and anxiety focuses the attention. The more you are anxious the more fear persists which seems to lead to a destructive cycle and even depression.

Let's take a knee injury. Some year ago during a karate training session I did a jumping kick and landed badly with my leg underneath me. I could hardly stand let alone walk and hobbled home. I visit the doctor who examined the knee and who told me that I had probably had a torn meniscus and might need surgery. He told me to forget about doing karate or running and that I would be lucky to walk again properly.

I recall feeling furious about his cold indifference. He had told me what I would not be able to do and at no time had mentioned what I could do.

He had in fact written off my future as a sportsman. He didn't even offer me an x-ray.

I left the surgery, however, feeling determined. I had a karate demonstration to do on Saturday at a fete and I was determined to meet this commitment. I strapped up the knee with a support and completed the demonstration barely noticing the pain but evidently hobbling.

I then researched all I could about the rehabilitation of injury. Further investigation showed that the meniscus was not torn but I found that the pain in my knee was still causing me hobble and hindering recovery. The wisdom then was that allowing movement in the joint would hinder recover and so I was advised to restrict movement as much as I could.

I chose to take the opposite view as I didn't want my leg to be frozen in to a narrower range of movement. I took advice from therapists who actually wanted sportsmen and women to recover and within 3 months I was kicking as well as ever and my knee now shows no sign of a problem even now at the age of 67 years old.


Do acupuncture and associated therapies work? Acupuncture is a real phenomenon. Thousands of books have been written on the subject and I have read a good few. My conclusion is that no-one knows how it works and over the years it has been related to biological energy flows in special channels and dressed up in all sorts of ways. Basically when it works it works and that is all there is.

Shingles. The pain is unbelievable. It is like being whipped by a Portuguese Man O' War with no respite day or night. The shingles virus surfaced about 7 years ago. It was on my face, body and went into my left eye. The good doctor gave me drugs to numb the pain. They made me feel so bad that I stopped them on day two.

I researched pressure points and found a point called the Kroun-Loun which is a special point for the alleviation of pain of all kinds. Using firm

pressure from my index finger I would activate the point whenever the pain became unbearable and it would give me relief to enable me to sleep. I could activate the point as many times as I liked. It worked. I still use it today and for some reason I have found that it also opens up my sinuses when they are blocked.

So do I believe in alternative remedies? The answer is a resounding YES if I find they work for me. Do I care how they work? The answer is NO.

Hughenden Parish 'Street Association'

What is the Hughenden Street Association?

The Hughenden Street Association is a parish-wide scheme striving to create a friendly and supportive community where people belong, have friends and look out for one-another. For this to happen, it requires residents to sign up their street and act as the eyes and ears to identify neighbours who may need some form of assistance.

Why a pilot in Hughenden?

In late 2015 the Hughenden Neighbourhood Action Group, Parish Councillors and members of the Residents Associations covering the eight villages and hamlets, came together with local government officers, Trading Standards, Thames Valley Police and Neighbourhood Watch to formulate plans for the protection of older and more vulnerable residents. Nearly one in three of the residents across Hughenden is over the age of 65 and the fastest growing proportion of the population is those of 80 years and older.

Hughenden is a low crime district but is within easy reach of the motorway network. Experience from similar districts in Buckinghamshire suggests that it is ripe territory for phone, postal and on-line frauds as well as doorstep crime. Over the last ten years the Trading Standards service has been notified of eighteen incidents of such crimes in the parish which is likely to be under-reported by as much as 900 per cent.

A Steering Group was established to look at how to address both the issue of hidden crime but also the vulnerabilities such as loneliness, isolation and cognitive decline that contribute to the exploitation by criminals. The Steering Group recognised very early that Hughenden was blessed with a thriving network of existing community groups, clubs and activists that only needed some joining up to encourage far greater inclusion and engagement across the community. This scheme has not been set up to compete with other initiatives in the area, on the contrary, it is there to provide tools and resources to complement what is already in place. The guiding ethos is that a neighbourhood with a strong sense of itself as a community is a safer & stronger community for everybody.

What can a Street Association offer your street?

Residents who sign their street will receive an information pack covering important issues to raise awareness of scams and doorstep crime affecting those who might be vulnerable. The pack also includes a signposting toolkit and details of local activities and organisations to direct individuals for support which can help to reduce loneliness and isolation. The resident will have resources in the pack to deliver to neighbours to let them know they can contact them if in need. If contacted, the resident will use the signposting toolkit to refer the neighbour to the appropriate service. The information pack is not unique to residents and can be circulated to other stakeholders such as the local community shop, faith groups and associations to enable a wider reach.

Anybody in the Parish, young or old can become a street member and commit as little or as much time to the scheme. There are further opportunities to be involved such as joining the steering group, providing feedback to shape the initiative or becoming a Ward Leader in one of the four wards to encourage activity from local residents. From time to time members will also have opportunities to attend free information workshops covering relevant topics such as crime prevention or dementia awareness.

What we have achieved so far

Hughenden Street Association launched in February 2017 and currently has 53 members covering their streets although it is a great distance from covering the wider Parish. Long-term, the aim is to sign up every street and create a sustainable Street Association where residents feel they are part of a safer and stronger community and know their neighbours are safe and well. So far, the association has organised two launch events, two workshops, an information awareness afternoon and has provided and attended various presentations, meetings and engagement events in the parish to promote the initiative. The project is monitored regularly and due to the success in Hughenden Parish to date, further Street

Anybody in the Parish can become a Street Member by offering just a little time to help their neighbours stay safe and well, creating a stronger and safer community. Due to the success in Hughenden Parish, further Street Associations are going ahead elsewhere in the County.

WDC Local Plan Timetable Update

Keen followers of the Local Plan will be aware that the Council intended to produce the next version of the new Local Plan this summer.

However, they have now confirmed that they will be taking the plan to their Cabinet and Council in September – sometimes referred to as 'publication'. This will be followed by a 6 week public consultation starting in October. They will submit the plan to the Government in Spring 2018 for examination. The timetable is then in the hands of the Planning Inspectorate and they would expect the Hearings to take place in the summer. This will probably lead to a further consultation on changes proposed by the Inspector, allowing WDC to adopt the plan in the Spring of 2019.

The delay in publishing the Plan is a result of WDC considering the implications of the Government's Housing White paper produced earlier this year, updating the evidence base that supports the Plan and continuing their negotiations with neighbouring Buckinghamshire Councils.



The National Trust at Hughenden

Many local people know that we look after Hughenden Manor and Estate, but few realise that the manor sits as part of a large portfolio and that we undertake a massive amount of varied conservation work locally. Our portfolio includes Hughenden Manor, West Wycombe Park, West Wycombe Village, Bradenham Manor, Bradenham Village and Princes Risborough Manor House. We also look after the Central Chilterns countryside which includes Coombe Hill, Low Scrubs, Pulpit Hill and Woods, Bradenham Woods, Watlington Hill, West Wycombe Hill, Hogback Wood, Aston and Juniper Bank as well as Fingest Farm. Our work is overseen by a team of 30 permanent full and part time staff, a number of seasonal staff and 450 volunteers

As if all of this isn't enough, we also manage a large number of local covenants. These total 4,000 acres and cover areas around the Hambleden Valley and large parts of the Hampden and Hughenden Valleys. We do not own these sites, but the covenants have been applied voluntarily to land and buildings by a previous owner for their future protection and preservation in perpetuity.

All of this activity is managed from our Estate Office at Hughenden and supported by our regional office at the Clare Centre in Saunderton. The amount of time that Hughenden Manor is open has increased in the last decade, meaning that we are now open 363 days per year. With the manor housing an internationally significant collection of objects, making sure that they are always cared for whilst ensuring that our visitors have a fantastic experience can be a challenge. We are also aware that our returning visitors like to see new things and so we work hard to provide a programme of changing exhibitions and events throughout the year.

We are currently working on an ambitious plan to open up more spaces at Hughenden Manor to our visitors. In addition, the West Bank in the garden has recently opened to the public for the first time ever, adding a significant amount of new space for visitors to enjoy. We are also working hard to conserve the West Wing of the manor, an area that was recently returned to us after over half a century of private occupation. We hope that the West Wing will eventually provide a wonderful new home for our ever more fascinating story of Operation Hillside, the code name given to the top secret RAF map making operation housed at Hughenden during World War II.

But in March 2015 the Library was the victim of a water leak which caused damage to the ornate plaster ceiling, various pieces of historic furniture, and around 40 books including a copy of Goethe's Faust given to Disraeli by Queen Victoria. Over the last two years skilled specialists have worked to painstakingly restore each item, and the completion of Faust's conservation treatment this summer will see Hughenden's most treasured historic showroom retuned to its former glory once again.

<u>Trailblazer Update for Teaching Assistant Standard</u>

We are delighted to be informed by the DfE that our new Teaching Assistant Standard has now been published. Work is continuing on the End Point Assessment Plan which needs to be completed before the new Standard can be implemented.

This is the culmination of a lot of hard work by a dedicated of team schools, training and assessment organisations across the country headed up by the Chair of the Employer Group, Jenny Brinkworth. This new Teaching Assistant Standard will replace the existing Level



3 frameworks and ensure the continuity of Teaching Assistant apprenticeships in schools across the Country.

Hughenden Primary School Awarded Primary Science Quality Mark

Primary Science Quality Awards have been awarded to 168 infant, junior, primary, middle and special schools to celebrate a commitment to excellence in science teaching and learning. So far, since its national launch in 2010, over 2300 schools across the UK have achieved the award. The Primary School Quality Mark scheme enables schools to work together to share good practice and is supported by professional development led by local experts. It encourages teacher autonomy and innovation while at the same time offering a clear framework for development in science subject leadership, teaching and learning.

The Primary Science Quality Mark is led by the University of Hertfordshire, School of Education in partnership with the Primary Science Teaching Trust. It is supported by the Royal Society for Chemistry, the Ogden Trust and the Association for Science Education.

Jane Turner, PSQM National Director, said: "Gaining a Primary Science Quality Award is a significant achievement for a school. The profile and quality of science teaching and learning in each awarded school is very high. Children are engaging with great science both in and outside the classroom, developing positive attitudes towards science as well as secure. Finding your vocation in life

One day, more than 25 years ago, an advertisement caught my eye in the jobs pages of a National broadsheet newspaper. The job was in telephone sales for a company who specialised in selling unit trusts and other investments, and they were based just off Oxford Street in London. The projected salary attracted me, although I was younger than the preferred starting age for applicants. Having thought about it for a day or two, I summoned up my courage, and called the number to register an interest in applying. The conversation was quite brief, but I overcame the first hurdle, by showing enthusiasm and refusing to allow my young age to deter me putting my case for employment across to him. He was sufficiently impressed to invite me for interview.

The following day I arrived at their offices, and the sight that greeted me as I walked into their vast boiler room of a sales floor was quite intimidating. I immediately felt ill at ease. The boss who interviewed me, welcomed me into his office, and put me straight on the spot with a series of questions — which went something like this:

"Keith, imagine I were to offer you a job, which just involved walking across Tower Bridge from one side to another all day. Would you do that job for £10,000 per year?" "No", I replied.

"Keith, imagine I were to offer you a job, which just involved walking across Tower Bridge from one side to another all day. Would you do that job for £10,000 per month?" "No", I replied. This second "no" slightly threw my interviewer — "Why ever not?"

"Because there has to be more to life than money, I want job satisfaction and the feeling that I am making a difference as well", I replied at once without hesitation.

"So, what are you doing here then", he demanded?

I gulped, red-faced, and was shown the door smartly, left the building with my head down, and thought — what a waste of an afternoon! However, after a period of reflection, that brief conversation became for me one of the defining moments in my life, and I am so thankful that I had that conversation, which helped me to think more seriously about my vocation in life.

I wonder, have you discovered your vocation in life? Young or old, we can all identify with things that we do well, and things that we shouldn't go near with a barge pole.

The Apostle Paul reflects a great deal about the diversity of gifts and individuals which exist within a Church family. Ask Peter

Question

I have had £2,200 premium bonds for just over a year and not won a bean. I am tempted to have a flutter on the lottery instead.

Answer

The premium bond fund pays out 1.15% in prizes so you have been a little unlucky. In a year the most likely win is £25 with probability of just over 50%. The probability of winning nothing at all is 42% and that is what has happened to you so far. The overall chance of your winning more in a year (from £50 up to £1,000,000) is just over 7%. In my 45 years in business and oversight of 500 plus clients, family and friends I have not yet seen anyone win £1,000,000. That is not to say it doesn't happen but it is quite rare. You can look up the winning numbers on line each month and there is a frisson of excitement wondering if "today is the day". In contrast to the lottery, your premium bonds are always safe and can be

encashed at any time. The prizes on the lottery are bigger and rarer still and when you have bought your ticket that's it. The money is gone. The great winners from the lottery are the various charities that have been supported. Perhaps that is something the National Savings Bank might think to emulate.

Question

My daughter seems to be perpetually up to her overdraft limit which I believe is £2,000 with no immediate prospect of it reducing. Should I help her out?

Answer

It is so easy to paint yourself into a corner financially and an authorised overdraft is likely to be costing £25 per month in interest and bank charges. I am not averse to using credit sensibly but running a long term overdraft is not sensible. Let's suppose you have £2,000 which you can spare to give to your daughter. You are giving up a return that is likely to be less than £1 per month so that your daughter can "win" £25 every month (ie by avoiding an overdraft charge). If your daughter accepts the new order, keeps her account in the black in future and saves £25 per month instead she would have £300 tax free by the end of a year. A gift in this way should be free of Inheritance Tax and potentially save your family £800 that might otherwise be paid.

Question

I resent paying anything by direct debit? Am I being a fool to myself?

Answer

When my father died 20 years ago I was very grateful that he had had the presence of mind to put all the regular bills on direct debit. Managing my elderly mother's finances at a distance was then a practical proposition for many years after. For my own part I make over 250 direct debit payments in total each year and there is never a hitch. That is not to say I don't review usage and tariffs from time to time and make the occasional change.



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
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


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
