

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Chair's Roundup

I am a long-term resident of Hughenden Valley, having moved into our house near the village hall in 1977, with Carolyn, my wife and our then 11-month-old son, James. Our family has since grown to three sons and five grandchildren.

When the children grew older, Carolyn joined the preschool over the road at the village hall and stayed there for ten years. During this time, she came to know many in the community and now is always pleased to bump into and be recognised by children she used to look after, now often parents themselves.

My career involved travel, much of which was spent commuting to London. Later on, there was travel around the UK but also with regular travel to Europe and USA. My early years were initially in procurement followed by a move into business planning and analysis. The latter twenty-five years of my career involved various positions in systems.

Leading up to retirement I worked as a presales technical engineer on storage systems and enjoyed the benefit of being based from home whilst covering UK and Europe. And I suppose it was during this period that I began to appreciate local issues and



the voluntary work done by members of our community. Till then I had done little by way of participation in community life.

In 2014 I joined local neighbours in creating the HVDIG (Hughenden Valley Drainage Improvement Group) because of our localised experiences with sewage flooding; I looked after the finances and the website. In 2020 I was invited to become Treasurer of the HVRA and in doing so, I brought the DIG under the umbrella of the HVRA.

Turning to the present day, the HVRA has survived a year without either a Chairman or Deputy Chairman, but we have continued merrily along. You may be surprised to learn that we do have plans for the future.

The core work of the residents association continues without interruption and typically involves news distribution (primarily via the Hughenden News), and representing residents' interests in key activities such as Planning, Speed Watch, Speed Limit Applications, Planters and the DIG.

The long-planned replacement of the planters for the village entrances is underway with the new, shiny planters already purchased. They should be planted up and placed by the time this issue of the magazine is published.

Longer term, our aim is to make the HVRA more relevant to our younger residents – here I mean families with school age children. We have a perceived need to:

Provide village activities or events that families want to attend and fit into their modern lifestyle

We foresee the need to modernise our communication with the community

Our first foray into a change in village activities is with the Family Summer Picnic on Sunday 10th August. Planning for this is well advanced and is for everyone locally but we want to especially welcome families. It is funded jointly by the HVRA and HVVH. We will be providing a range of free-of-charge activities. Look out for free kids' ice creams.

As a start on refreshing our communication we are working on a redesign of the HVRA website, which has remained largely unchanged for some years now. We are seeking to improve the look and feel of the website as well as incorporate some exciting new features. We expect this work to come to fruition later in the year.

HVRA AGM

Over 20 people attended the HVRA 2025 Annual General Meeting held on 6th May.

Some highlights are presented here:

Paul Woodford presented a round-up of the past year:

Introduction

Despite not having a formal Chair & Deputy Chair, HVRA managed to sustain strong levels of activity in the past year through a combination of hard work and particularly teamwork.

The Committee would like to thank our Road Reps for the sterling work they do in delivering magazines and collecting subscriptions. We would also like to thank the Committee members who double up as Road Reps but also take on additional roles in bringing together all the activities that HVRA undertakes. It would be too difficult to mention every one of our volunteers in this report, some twenty in all, but they know who they are.

Fundraising, Charitable and Social Events

This year we ran three events:

The Potter Cup Quiz. (Strictly speaking, we ran two Quizzes this financial year – in April 2024 and March 2025). The Quiz is important to us as a fundraiser; the 2024 quiz was the last prepared and presented by Al

Bowyer and his team, and we must give thanks for his and their work over the years.

The 2025 Quiz was completely new and created from scratch by a new team within the HVRA and ably fronted on the night by our newest Road Rep. The event was sold out, possibly because of the reputation of the excellent supper that was laid on.

Summer Barn Dance. This was a repeat of the 2023 barn dance which had gone down a storm. But this year the attendance figures were low and ticket sales greatly reduced. Having said that, those who went had a great time and a small profit was generated thanks to the raffle that was run on the night.

Christmas Gift Bags. For us it has become the norm to alternate the Christmas charitable works between the Seniors Tea and the Christmas Gift Bags. Doing both in the same year would be too much work and this year Road Reps delivered the Gift Bags to 130 recipients which were much appreciated, and the number is expanding year on year.

Activities and Initiatives

HVRA works on a variety of activities on an on-going basis. These include:

Hughenden News. The magazine has had a great year with a subtle redesign, resulting in a pleasing freshness and a wider content. We must thank the Parish Council for the £500 grant we receive each year in support of the costs of producing the magazine.

Speed Watch Sessions continue to be run through the year, which, along with data from the Speed Device opposite Deeter provide useful stats to the Police and so contribute to overall road safety and, hopefully, reduced speed through the villages.

Speed Limit on Cryers Hill. A petition was raised this year to reduce the 50mph speed limit on Cryers Hill to 40mph, and was well supported not only by residents but also the North West Chilterns Community Board. It remains in process.

Planning. A continuous watch is kept on planning applications; the main focus presently is on Orchard Caravans to the rear of properties along Warrendene Road.

Planters. HVRA has planned to replace the existing planters as they have become worn out. We are purchasing fewer but high-quality galvanised troughs – initially at HVRA expense, but we hope that an exceptional grant may be approved by the Parish Council to fund this.

DIG. The Drainage Improvement Group has had a busy year, involved with:

- Overpumping outside the Surgery to ease pressure on the sewage infrastructure.
- Attendance at Chalk Stream Project workshops to assist planning of the Hughenden Stream Restoration.
- Work with affected residents and Bucks Council on the flooding in Warrendene Road with Valley Road and Bryants Bottom. Liaise with BC on road drainage improvements and Natural Flood Management planning for the two areas.

The Future

The work done by the HVRA is exceptional considering the shortage of volunteers, something that is so frequently found in organisations such as ours. As always we would welcome new volunteers, especially younger ones, to help with the running of the HVRA.

We are aware that three social events are sustainable each year for the HVRA given our present volunteer level but no more than that. It is important that we continue to raise money to support our charitable spends, but that is not all. We want to be relevant to a wider audience and that means providing events that residents, particularly families, want to come to. As a result, this coming August we are planning a Summer Family Picnic which focuses

on being an event primarily aimed at families. A disco, bouncy castle, games and entertainments will be provided at no cost to the residents but funded jointly by the HVRA and Village Hall Committee.

We have the offer of help from a local resident to work on IT systems for the HVRA. We are starting with the redesign and updating of the HVRA website. This will include such features as online advertising and subscriptions payment. We hope to follow this up with the development of a digital archive and other projects.

Treasurer's Report

Paul also prepared the Treasurer's Report (he's a busy chap) for Year 1st April 2024 to 31st March 2025

The accounts were reviewed and signed off by Bob Hawkins. Many thanks to Bob for his continued support of HVRA.

The Accounts Financial Summary for the year ended 31st March 2025 shows a surplus of £2050. Cash in the current and deposit accounts have built up this year to £16801, which is up from £14751 last year. During this year we transferred £2000 to the deposit account. £138 in interest was added to the deposit account this year.

Advertising income received this year was £3336, which is comparable to last year, but less than we would like to see. We are seeking additional

advertisers for the Summer and Winter editions of the magazine. Subscriptions of £5 per household for membership of HVRA amounted to £2495. This equates to a 71% coverage of residences in our catchment. Thanks must go to our Road Reps for collecting subscriptions. Whilst large amounts of subs are paid online, it continues to be the case that many residents are happier paying at the door.

Income from Fundraising and Other sources included the two Potter Cup events held in 2024 and 2025 which raised net income of £623 and £714 respectively. The 2024 event income was put toward the Christmas Gift Bags and the 2025 event funds will go towards a Seniors social event later this year. The Barn Dance this year raised a net amount of £147. The Hughenden Parish grant of £500 was received this year, which helps offset the production costs of the Hughenden News magazine.

- Expenditure this year was £5962, slightly lower than last year.
 Notable expenditure included:
- Magazine print and distribution costs amounted to £2983
- Village Hall hire costs for HVRA meetings were £260.
- Flower planters expenditure was £485.
- Senior Citizens Gift Bags costs were £881 (paid for partly from 2024 Potter Cup income)
- Insurance costs were £158

Note that some of this Year's Surplus. of £2050, will cover the print costs of the Spring edition of the magazine.

Finally, the key points from the draft minutes of the AGM:

From September 2025, our meeting will be held on the second Wednesday of each month (apart from January and August), in the Committee room of the Village Hall.

Horatio's Garden

Once the formalities were completed, an interesting and informative talk was given by Nikki Blagg on "Horatio's Garden"

https://www.horatiosgarden.org.uk/

Their work is summarised as:

"Horatio's Garden nurtures the well-being of people after spinal injury in beautiful, vibrant sanctuaries within the heart of NHS spinal injury centres".

Every year there are over four thousand new severe spinal cases, who are treated in 11 centres across the UK. Some cases require prolonged and / or repeated stays in hospital.

A key feature is that a garden environment is decidedly different from the clinical world in which the patient can find themselves spending long periods. Therefore, the gardens have space for wheelchairs and even beds. With the help of professional garden designers, the gardens are springing up and receive strong positive feedback from carers, families and patients. The first garden was opened in 2012 in Salisbury.

Their largest garden is at Stoke Mandeville, it was designed by Joe Swift. The gardens are provided by the charity - the NHS cannot not fund them.

HVRA Updates

Warrendene Road – 25/05071/CLP – Certificate of Lawfulness

for the Proposed Use or Development of the Land as a caravan site

On 10 th January this year, the owner of the Orchard site engaged new Planning Consultants who submitted a Supporting Statement that contained 198 pages plus 115 pages of supporting evidence, making a total of 313 pages for just one additional caravan (from 3 to 4).

Finally on Friday, 26th June, after analysing the lengthy submission, Bucks Planning Officer, Charles Power, signed the Certificate of Lawfulness for proposed use of land for the siting of four residential static caravans (an increase of 1 additional residential caravan). Unfortunately, this could be a maximum of 65' x 22' in size and located anywhere on the orchard site!

At this time of the year, one would normally expect the drainage issues in the valley to disappear so that we can all relax for the summer. Not so this year!

Last Autumn's heavy rain resulted in the stream flowing through the village quite early, during December I think. Then, the prolonged dry spell in the Spring caused the stream to dry up, again quite early as it will normally flow through to the Summer.

But on 12th May the Valley was hit by a monumental thunderstorm accompanied by exceptional rain and hailstones of an extraordinary size. It resulted in flash flooding. Sadly, we saw The Harrow flooded and nearby houses similarly affected yet again.

The work undertaken by Bucks Council on the Warrendene ditch was clearly insufficient to help prevent this flooding; more work is needed.

Additionally, we saw Deeters frontage and nearby houses along Valley Road flooded in their rear gardens where the stream flows. The latter flood was likely caused by the inability of the stream to cope with the sudden large flood of water. There is a possibility that this may have resulted from lack of maintenance of the stream bed in this area.

Further down the valley we saw the stream surge and carry down large amounts of flotsam and jetsam which can easily block the flow of the stream at pinch points. Near the Village Hall,





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houses normally affected by sewage issues saw inspection pits close to the road fill and spill sewage into gardens, prompting an unpleasant clean-up in ensuing days.

In this regard it is timely for us to print an extract from the Bucks Council document on the responsibilities of homeowners with the stream running through their gardens, details below.

At the time of going to print, the promised and much-delayed Flood Management meeting had just been scheduled to take place on 17th June in Naphill Village Hall. We hope to report on the meeting in the next issue.

Bucks Council Advice - Your rights and responsibilities as a riparian owner

You have the right to protect your property from flooding, and your land from erosion, if:

- Your land boundary is adjacent to a watercourse it's assumed that you own the land up to the centre of the watercourse, unless stated otherwise in your property deeds
- a watercourse runs through or underneath (through a culvert or pipe) land that you own.

However, you must get any plans approved by the relevant authority prior to starting work - see information about applying for land drainage consent.

As a riparian owner, you:

- must let water flow through your land without any obstruction, pollution, or diversion which affects the rights of others
- must accept flood flows through your land, even if these are caused by insufficient capacity downstream
- must maintain the bed and banks of the watercourse and the trees and shrubs growing on the banks
- must keep the watercourse banks clear of anything that could cause an obstruction and increase flood risk, either on your land or downstream this includes any litter or loose vegetation, even if they did not come from your land
- must keep structures, such as culverts, trash screens, weirs, and mill gates, clear of debris
- must control invasive alien species such as Japanese knotweed we can advise you on how to manage and control these species

You may have noticed the new planters dotted around the Village and at Bryant's Bottom. They have been in the planning stage for a significant time but have finally come to fruition

Brenda Morris pioneered the idea of placing colourful planters around the village and on behalf of the HVRA has been maintaining them over a number of years. She is now stepping back. We thank her for all her efforts in helping to make our Village look so beautiful.

HVRA has purchased five new galvanised troughs which we have placed at the gates into the village from North Dean and Cryers Hill, at the roundabout at the entrance to Boss Lane, the corner into Fryers Gardens and the entrance gate into Bryants Bottom. They have been filled with compost and planted up and hopefully with all the rain we are getting they will thrive.

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Reduction in Speed Petition Update

Cryers Hill and Valley Road Reduction in Speed Petition Update



It certainly seems like it's been some time since we launched the petition on 20th November last year. We were looking for support to get a reduction from 50mph to

40 mph. It was open until 18th December and received 186 supporters. The petition was then considered by the council who produced a report which suggested an official Speed Assessment was appropriate for Cryers Hill but not Valley Road.

This was discussed at the North-West Chilterns Community Board on 6th March. At the meeting I put forward our views again and the Board agreed to part-fund the Speed Assessment. However, the Board was closing and merging with another one to become a larger body called North Chilterns

Community Board. This new Board has not had its first meeting yet as roles have yet to be decided after the recent elections. At its first meeting they will confirm the support available. I will attend on behalf of our Association.

I recently met with the local Parish Council to ask for the other part of the funding required for the Speed Assessment. It was agreed that when the Community Board confirms how much they will give the Parish Council will match-fund. They did say that providing the part-funding for the Speed Assessment was not an agreement to necessarily fund further costs in the project once fully defined.

As you can see, we are in what is a long process, but progress has been made, and I will continue to push it forward to what I hope will be a happy conclusion.

Hughenden Weather Roundup

As I've been running a weather station for Hughenden Valley since 2018, in each edition of Hughenden News, I'll be looking at some of the trends and writing about anything particularly noteworthy.

After an incredibly dull February, March and April certainly made amends. Indeed, it was the warmest and sunniest Spring on record. In turn, the weather was remarkably dry too. In fact, it was the driest spring in more than 100 years, according to data from the Met Office and in Hughenden, we recorded just 12mm of rain in March.

The weather turned more unsettled in April with 45mm of rain but still much drier than average. With the clear skies during spring, we also had some particularly chilly nights. Being in a valley means that the temperature at night often falls further than in other areas, which is why we can sometimes experience a frost, when people in other areas don't have to scrape their cars in the morning!

In May, the dry couple of months ended dramatically. Thunderstorms had been forecast for later in the day on the 12th May and just before 4pm the skies darkened, and rain started to fall.

Not only that, but large hail the size of marbles blanketed much of Hughenden to my daughter's surprise when she came home from school! The sound was deafening and at one point I wondered if the car would be dented by the size of the hail.

June has been a mixed month so far, although the latter half at the time of writing is due to be much warmer and drier. We'll see how long it lasts!

June 2025 report

Already into meteorological summer and what a roller-coaster we're on. Having gone through the wetter than average winter, with associated floods and saturated ground for weeks on end, we have just had the driest and warmest spring since records began.

The spring dry spell tricked a lot of plants into precocious early growth, in some cases early flowering. This was pretty much manageable by gardeners (excluding the extraordinary damage caused by the freak hailstorm on 12 May) but for the conservation banking the story pans out a little differently. The banking went through February and March in an unusually saturated condition, this despite being essentially comprised of chalk and therefore normally quick draining. However, the relatively warm temperatures meant that plant growth was not unduly slowed ... trees were in leaf, grass and new understorey growth was looking suspiciously rampant. As soon as the dry spell took hold the chalk quickly dried out and the management team were able to put in some quality time keeping undergrowth in check and reducing stands of tall dogwood, in order to keep grassed areas clear, as well as continuing work along the football pitch/banking boundary. This latter effort is aimed at maintaining as wide a touch-line strip as practicable whilst clearing sufficient undergrowth, brambles and saplings to renew the growth of wildflower species in the bank margins.

The dry spring has cut both ways: a lot of the grass has slowed its growth, not a bad thing for us, but orchids seem, on the whole, to be late coming into flower; cowslips put on a very good show quite early and seemed to enjoy the good weather; dog roses, blackthorn and hawthorn blossom have all been magnificent but, conversely, the blackthorn fruit (the sloes) don't seem to have coped well with the wet/dry/hailstorm/wet again cycle. Is the sloe gin crop in danger!

June 2nd bestowed a good evening upon the Group. Usually the first Monday of June, the beginning of summer, sees the walk around on the conservation area fronted by John Moorby, the Group leader, for the Village Hall Committee and other invitees. The early evening sun was out and the grass was dry; there were indeed some orchids to welcome everyone and the birds were providing a background soundtrack. We think it fair to say that a pleasant and instructive time was had by all; John and the members of the Group are grateful for the levels of interest shown in, and appreciation of, the work we undertake on the bank.

We now hope for a good summer; some more dry weather perhaps with light showers overnight just to keep things ticking over (!!??). There is a lot of promise; many wildflowers, wildlife and invertebrates still to make their appearance. There is the likelihood that there will be new arrivals,

particularly flowers, especially in areas we have cleared of tall grass and undergrowth. Where the flowers lead the invertebrates won't be far behind and so we hope for even more variety in the moth and butterfly populations and maybe, an increase in glowworm numbers. Yes.....they are still there!!

Whilst not within our chalk bank management remit, we like to make mention in this article of the Hughenden chalk stream. The stream is right next door, the footpath from the Village Hall football field/the banking leads directly into the National Trust land by the water pumping station. Although it is not yet perfect (in health terms, no thanks to Thames Water) the stream is looking at its best for many years; all three springs, from the boundary of the pumping station, down the length of the field, to the edge of the old orchard at Church Farm, are "springing" and the water is clear (DON'T drink it!). It's a beautiful site and, like our banking, is a rare piece of our heritage. At any time, you are likely to see Mallard ducks; frequently see a Grey Heron, and recently

Moorhen (benefiting from the taller grasses around the central spring). It's a joy, really, and due to all last winter's rain, the water table is high so the stream is still in full flow through the Valley. That too is fairly rare!

Remember, our banking (and the

stream) is in a National Landscape. Doesn't have much of the ring that its former designation did – Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty – but that's what it is. The name change has not affected what it is. We promise that we will maintain it for you to preserve both its beauty and its rarity. But we need your help...

We ask you to come along and visit the area, get to know it, understand it, and value it.

Please don't disrespect it, litter or foul it.

There is no payment required from you except that you leave a smile. Just come along, be happy, bring a smile, open eyes, and a light tread. And enjoy!

May Elections & Vacancies

Following the elections on 1st May, six nominees stepped forward and were elected unopposed to the Parish Council. On 6th May, the Council started its Annual Meeting, where Councillor Gareth Cadwallader was elected as Chair. Former Chair, Stan Jones, was co-opted back onto the Council at this meeting, members voted to defer the rest of the meeting to the 13th May.

The Annual Parish Meeting also took place on the 6th May at Great Kingshill Village Hall, attended by residents, Councillors from the Parish Council, Ridgeway East Councillors David Carroll and Steve Broadbent. Councillor Broadbent was also the guest speaker giving a talk on highways focusing on the Parish. We sincerely appreciate everyone who joined us.

At the reconvened Annual Meeting on 13th May, four new applications for co-option were received, bringing the Council to eleven members out of a possible fifteen. While this is great progress, there are still four vacancies—one for each ward across the parish. Thanks to the increased number of councillors, we have been able to fully establish standing committees for Environment & Services, Finance, Human Resources, and Planning, along with working groups for Allotments, Road Safety, and Communication.

We would love to see more local residents stepping forward to fill the

remaining vacancies! Parish councillors commit one or two evenings a month for meetings, plus some time engaging with residents and the Chief Officer. Local knowledge and vigilance are key to addressing important issues such as development pressures, speeding, road safety, and maintaining green spaces.

Recent Parish Council contributions have supported the installation of two allotment gates, assisted the Grange Area Trust in securing land, funded Widmer End Residents Association for path improvements, and helped the Widmer End Lawn Tennis Club. We also continue working with local councillors David Carroll and Steve Broadbent to tackle speeding issues around the Parish. This is precisely the kind of work where more councillors can make a real difference.


Summer Picnic and Raffle!

Our association is noted for innovations that have included the Bucks New University scheme and schemes at several mosques. This year we have set up our first Youth Watch Scheme at Cressex Community school, further extending our age range.

Thames Valley Police have redefined their borders within Bucks of their three police areas, Aylesbury, Wycombe and South Bucks, and we are working with them to ensure our operations are compatible.

We also work closely with Bucks Council Safety Team, regularly attending events they organise.

Cons and scams represent some 50% of all crimes with criminals dreaming up new versions every day. The general rule is if you get any communication you do not expect, phone, mail or e-mails, do not respond immediately, have a good think about whether it could be luring you into giving away personal details that could be used against you.

Burglaries continue and tend to happen in bursts as some criminals move around the country and sometimes descend on our area. If an area is covered by a NHW scheme, with members aware of the steps to fight back, it tends to deter burglars who would rather have an easier time somewhere else.

More expensive cars are still being stolen from drives because of the new remote door opening technology. You

can prevent it by making sure your car keys are inaccessible. Drug dealing continues to be commonplace and it is important to report it and any other crime to the police. All information is recorded and acted on based on its severity. If you see drug dealing in your area, reported it each time it is seen, and by all those who witness it, so it raises its level of severity and will be acted on accordingly – so keep reporting.

Apart from continuing to add schemes and scheme leaders, we also need to boost our committee, preferably with some younger members. Volunteers would be most welcome.

Being a member of a NHW scheme can make you feel safer and be safer in your home and neighbourhood.

OH, SO SOON!

I received an email the other day.....
"Please submit articles for the next edition of the magazine before 13 June".

Aaaaaaaagghh! It can't be that time already! Oh, so soon! The ink's hardly dry from the last submission!

Still, here goes...

FLYING TIME

Nothing to do with birds (of which, more later) but reflections on spring and how fast time seems to be going. The weather has, until this last week, been exceptionally good: we've had the driest and warmest spring (meteorologically speaking) sincewho knows; depends on who you listen to, but a long time. Many of us (so not just me) got going with the new season's planting. In my case, lots of non-stop begonias, quite a few pelargoniums, runner beans and lettuces. In pots on the patio, I planted a decorative solarnum, a honeysuckle and a summer-flowering jasmine. The abutilon which had been covered with fleece over winter I uncovered, as it was coming into leaf. My orange tree had lost all its fruit in the cold greenhouse but it was coming into flower so I brought it out to the patio too: at least I would get the smell but no fruit again this year. The azalea was in full, glorious flower. Of course, they all needed quite a bit of watering. Oh,

so soon! But a glorious April/May for all that. Also, I had mowed the lawn, so I didn't have that as a job.

Then 12 May......the worst 35 minutes of the largest hail stones I remember in my 29 years in the Valley.

Goodbye begonias, most of the beans, young lettuce, shot-blasted rhubarb and a wrecked once-statuesque dill. The azalea was completely stripped, the solarnum and the abutilon both very ragged and the orange down to about a quarter of its leaves (though the blossom was untouched!). Part of the house drainage down-pipe came adrift, because it couldn't cope with the volume of water off the roof: this meant that the feed to the water butt was lost So got no replenishment of what was taken during the hot weather.

Still, I was luckier than several friends and neighbours who, in some cases, lost more plants and garden equipment but also suffered building damage. The Harrow, unfortunately, was caught again in the cycle of valley flooding.

Now we're in the run-up to summer. Hopefully we will get back to some nice weather: the damaged gardens need replenishing and, in any case, holidays are fast approaching.

FLYING TIME - BIRDS

Since the last magazine edition, the regular birds have all graced us with their presence: Gold and

Greenfinches, Chaffinches, Collared Doves, Dunnocks, all types of Tits, Fifth Columnist Jackdaws, plus newbies – several Magpies. But as they fly, so does time: they have, mostly, paired up and already raised chicks. You might even say that, for some of them, their holidays are approaching and it will be time to fly off. Oh, so soon!

Merle and Oberon? Although neighbours have reliably informed me that they have heard choruses of the Trimfone Rhapsody, I begin to think that my resident pair are not Merle and Oberon, since Oberon looks quite sleek and slim compared to previous years. He certainly plays a beautiful tune but not the Rhapsody of old.

I hate to be Darwinist about this but I think he might really be a descendant of Oberon the Jazz Great. He has not learned the subtle variations of the Trimfone chord changes. I just hope he works on his grandad's teachings - I don't want him coming in my garden with atonal, modernist mutterings or Punk reimaginings of anthemic Be-Bop. Anyway, Merle won't like it.

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

Ink, pens and paintbrushes; Writing history at Hughenden New exhibition launches 2 June 2025

New exhibition shows how the use of pens and paintbrushes at Hughenden shaped both national and international history

Rare and never-before-seen objects on display for the first time

Includes personal correspondence with Queen Victoria and newly discovered personal histories from the Second World War mapmakers stationed at Hughenden

Launching on 2 June, Ink, Pens, and Paintbrushes; Writing History at Hughenden highlights the transformative power of the pen and paintbrush at Hughenden, shaping local, national, and international histories. This exhibition features key objects such as the Congress of Berlin fan, an original handwritten manuscript of Sybil, a gift from Queen Victoria (the book Faust), mapmaking instruments, maps, and letters.

Benjamin Disraeli, the Victorian Prime Minister, lived at Hughenden Manor from 1848 to 1881. In July 1878, Disraeli successfully negotiated a settlement at the Congress of Berlin, aiming to curb Russian aggression and secure the Ottoman Empire. Hughenden's Collections and House Manager, Rob Bandy, remarked that

the signature on the fan "was perhaps the most historically significant signature of his life."

The Ottoman delegate, grateful for Disraeli's decisive influence, had a cherrywood fan signed by each delegate. This unique memento, featuring signatures from numerous European politicians, including Disraeli's, is on display in the exhibition.

While Disraeli is primarily remembered for his political career, he was also a renowned author during the Victorian era. Rob noted, "Among his literary works, he notably critiqued the extremes of wealth and poverty brought about by the Industrial Revolution in his book Sybil." Visitors can view the original unbound handwritten manuscript of Sybil (1845) and enjoy comfortable seating to read the first chapter. For younger visitors, storybooks are available for all ages.

Disraeli's relationship with Queen Victoria, initially unfavourable, evolved into a close friendship, making him her favourite Prime Minister. Their personal correspondence is on display, including a special gift from Queen Victoria—a copy of the book Faust, signed and inscribed on the first page. This gift elevated Disraeli's social standing at a time when his credentials were uncertain.

During the Second World War, the penmanship of those who worked at Hughenden Manor changed the progress of the war. Hughenden was requisitioned by the Air Ministry and code-named Hillside. Its role remained shrouded in secrecy for decades after the war. Much of what we know about Hillside was discovered over 60 years later, when a volunteer room guide overheard a visitor recounting his wartime experiences at Hughenden. This chance encounter in 2004 led to the unravelling of a remarkable story.

The new exhibition highlights people and objects not included in the existing Hillside Exhibition, focusing on four staff members who worked at Hughenden during the war: Beth Heron, Harry Levitt, Kathleen Hudson, and Kenneth Stevens.

Beth Heron, a cook at Hillside, provided the only contemporary written history from that time through her letters.
Hughenden's

Senior Collections & House Officer, Pippa Slaytor, emphasised the importance of these letters: "Through Beth's writing, we have discovered day-to-day life at Hughenden during Hillside and the names of mapmakers and other RAF personnel who were otherwise unrecorded." Kathleen Hudson, Harry Levitt, and Kenneth Stevens were all mapmakers at Hillside. Kenneth Stevens donated his map-making implements and other mementos from his time at Hughenden. Additionally, Harry Levitt's family donated an original map from Hillside. These items are now on display. Through Kathleen's oral history, we have gained insight into the mindset of a mapmaker. She acknowledged the emotional impact of her work, despite her duty to the war effort.

The exhibition connects both eras of Hughenden's history, highlighting the enduring power of the pen and paintbrush and the legacy of Hughenden across the world. Ink, Pens, and Paintbrushes; Writing History at Hughenden is on display until November 2025.

Over the next three years, local partners will lead the project in close collaboration with the community to ensure it reflects local needs and aspirations. The goal is to create a more connected and sustainable cultural network that boosts pride in the town and ensures everyone can benefit from the area's rich creative offer.

Peter Brazier, Buckinghamshire Council's Cabinet Member for Culture and Leisure, said:

"This is a fantastic opportunity for High Wycombe's creative sector. The investment will not only support local artists and cultural organisations but also help foster a more connected and dynamic cultural scene. We're excited to work with our partners and residents to ensure this funding delivers real benefits for the whole community."

Peter added: "This investment will mark the beginning of more local events and activities that enrich the lives of our residents and showcase the incredible talent and creativity we have here in High Wycombe."

Lallie Davis, Director of Bucks Culture, commented:

"This project promises to be transformative for High Wycombe's

creative community. It's about more than just funding events – it's about creating a connected network in the town, promoting opportunities, sharing skills, bringing people together through creativity, and making culture a visible and valued part of daily life. We're proud to be working with such a passionate and talented local community to shape a vibrant cultural future for the town."

Remembering David Lowe

5th Oct 1947 - 7th April 2025

David Lowe was born in Southend-on-Sea to Thomas and Florence. They already had a daughter, Sheila, born at the start of the war, but Tom (David's Dad) had to make his way back from the North Africa campaign, so Dave didn't make an appearance until October 1947. He was the apple of his mother's eye and she spoilt him rotten!

Growing up in Southend with his cousins, he was sorry to leave but his Dad had to go to High Wycombe for a job at the Post Office. There, David met his life-long friend, Alan, and with a few other boys went fishing and scouting.

When Dave turned 17, he bought a scooter and became a 'mod', wearing a parka and a hair-cut to go with it. A couple of years later, he met Hazel, also a 'mod' at the time, and they spent the next few years going off to see the bands of the day, notably The Who, The Stones, and Georgie Fame.

At the age of 23 and 20, Dave and Hazel got married. Having had lots of adventures doing long-distance walking, owning horses, belonging to an Archaeological Society, becoming hippies, lots of parties, and generally enjoying themselves.

Shortly after they moved to Hughenden Valley where their three sons were born. William, Jamie and Peter.

David had attended John Hampden school. After trying quantity surveying and a successful management career at Currys in High Wycombe, he started his own garden landscaping business, Valley Garden Services.

As well as running a local gardening firm Dave and Hazel were cub and scout leaders in both Hughenden Valley and Naphill for over 20 years. Both Dave and Hazel remained part of the scouting movement into their 70's. Recently, Bear Grylls sent them a letter of thanks for their long service to the scouting movement.

The many years living in Hughenden Valley were a rich and fruitful time, being involved in the local community, scouting, village events, (village day in particular,) the church bazaar and auction, and so many other things too numerous to mention. He also employed local boys on Saturdays to help with the mowing. Many of them were friends of his sons, and came to Fairholme for B-B-Q's and parties, often sleeping over in the house or garden. It became quite a social hub.

Dave was very active and always encouraging his boys to take part. They were lucky to spend a lot of time with him in that respect. They did a lot together including Scouting, surfing, ski-ing, hiking, camping, football and working together in Valley Garden Services. Creating lots of great memories.

At the age of 60, Dave was diagnosed with a serious lung condition which he thought had been triggered by a skiing trip. Unfortunately, it was more serious than that, but medication gave him more than 10 years of a good quality of life. During this time, Dave and Hazel downsized to a bungalow in Naphill. They bought a boat on the

Thames which they enjoyed for eight years. Throughout his life, Dave loved his garden, and the garden at Vincents Way is testament to his skill.

Through his involvement with the Church, Scouts and Hughenden Valley he touched a great many people with his optimistic outlook on life and will be greatly missed.

Remembering Judy Biggs

Judy was born 1935 and grew up in Prestwood. She and Dad Barry got married in 1957 and lived in Challock with Nanny (Hetty) until 1959 when they moved to Trees Road. I was born in 1959 and Belinda in 1964.

In 1972 we moved to Fleetwood (next door to Challock) on the Valley Road.

Judy enjoyed joining in with lots of village activities like Bingo, Drama, Cricket teas on Sunday afternoons, Bazaars, jumble sales, HAGA, Hall dances and various committees. She was a Brownie leader with Jean Goodman for many years. She also helped the Multiple Sclerosis group for nearly 40 years.

Judy worked as a receptionist at Hughenden Surgery for nearly 30 years.

Dad died in 2021, and on the same

day Mum had a bad fall hitting her head causing a bleed on the brain, she recovered enough to live at home for another year. She then moved into Little Oaks care home, where she joined in with the activities there, and we were able to join as well.

Sadly, after a month's stay in hospital, she returned to the home to be cared

for until she died peacefully on the 20th April Easter Sunday.

Judy was a very special lady who enjoyed spending time with her family and friends.

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
